Nature Nugget Listening Pictures

This activity tests Pathfinder's knowledge of small insects. Pathfinders will have fun finding and describing their small creatures to others who can't see them.

Time – Forty-five minutes

Materials – Cups, magnifying glasses, blank paper and charcoal.

Directions – Divide into trios. Give a cup, magnifying glass, paper and charcoal to each trio. Ask one Pathfinder in each trio to find a tiny creature under leaves or along the edge of a stream or lake. The smaller the better. Say: "After you find your little critter, put it into the cup. Don't let the other two people see it. Use the magnifying glass; describe it without telling what it is. The other two people should sketch it with charcoal. Then see how accurately they sketched it. Change roles until everyone has had a turn finding a creature and describing it"

A variation is to use larger objects that require no magnification. Partners sit back to back while one partner describes and the other sketches.

Counselor's Corner

In the last couple year's *Pathfinder Pathways* there has been an article about putting together a "Counselor's Survival Kit". We've included the information again for those of you that are new counselors. If you are a counselor and don't already have one, it's never too late to put a kit together. If you already have one, check through it and make sure you have everything that you need.

No matter how well you plan and organize there still may be times when you need a "Survival Kit". Make sure to take the survival kit to meetings and any other times when you might have to come up with something when things don't go as planned. This kit would have supplies in it to use when unexpected things happen. Don't use this kit as a substitute for planning (except for the pencils, rope and Bible).

Here's a list of some items that could be included.

- Pencils
- Crayons or colored pencils
- Bible
- Rope enough rope cut to appropriate lengths to teach about knots. Also include a couple of knot games.
- A couple of games and any supplies required. Also be sure to know how to play them, don't wait until you need them to figure it out.
- Honor information and supplies this should be an honor that could be completed in 45 – 60 minutes. It would help if it were one that most of the Pathfinders didn't already have. Some easy honors to do are dogs, cats and mammals.
- Keep in mind the grade that you are most likely planning for. You wouldn't include the same items when planning for 10th grade as you would when planning for 5th graders.
- Have a rainy day activity for that campout when rain wasn't forecast.
- Use the kit when you end up with twice as many Pathfinders as you planned your meeting for that week. Make sure that you have enough supplies.
- Or when you only have one Pathfinder and you planned for six. Teach one of the honors that everyone else has and that one Pathfinder doesn't. Or teach an honor that isn't on the schedule for that year.

Little Cedar Mountain

Little Cedar Mountain of today is actually the top of the Little Cedar Mountain of days gone by. It juts out into and borders on today's Nickajack Lake that covers its flanks. Little Cedar Mountain is one of the home grounds of Dragging Canoe, last of the great Cherokee war chiefs. His own town, Running Water (now called 'Whiteside'), is just a mile upriver, and another of his "Lower Towns," Nickajack, is right across the river. These were two of the five towns of the Chickamaugan Cherokees, the most serious and determined resistance to white settlement in the East Tennessee area. This area was occupied by various other native peoples including the Creeks. Four small caves on the west side of Little Cedar were probably used by Mississippi peoples prior to Creek occupation. Today, it is a part of the public lands owned by TVA, acquired by eminent domain, and where a controversial private development is planned.

While there are no developed hiking trails it is still public land and it is possible to hike there and view the area relatively unchanged. In the next year if it is developed as planned, it will no longer be a public site. Access to Little Cedar Mountain is by parking near the interstate exit on a pull off from the Shellmound Road.

There is an existing trail from the base of Little Cedar Mountain to the top and then to a point overlooking the lake. There are some wildflowers in this area. Also there are some interesting rock formations that look as though they originated and were reshaped by water in a cave. (Please remember that digging or removal of archaeological or biological resources is illegal and subject to prosecution.) Down this road adjacent to the dam is the Shellmound Recreation Area that has picnic facilities, restrooms and parking.

Nearby, on the opposite side of the lake is Nickajack Cave, which is currently maintained by TVA as a Wildlife Refuge for it harbors a large colony of gray bats. In the evening in the summer you may view these swarming from the cave at dusk from an observation platform. To reach Little Cedar Mountain from Chattanooga, take I24 toward Nashville, take exit #158 and follow signs for Nickajack Dam. For Nickajack Cave, take exit #161 to Route 156 south to Maple View Recreation Area.

Computer Connection

Does your club have Pathfinder website? It's possible that there's one and you didn't even know it. A club website can be a great way provide information to Pathfinder(s) and their families.

Honor Toolbox Sanctuary Honor

As some of you may or may not know there is now a Sanctuary honor. Below is a portion of an email sent to FOF honor coordinator from Debbie Winters-Marlin showing how the Lord works.

I had decided that I really didn't want to go to the Camporee since the full-scale model
Sanctuary was not going to be there and the honor patch was not finalized. However, I know that the Sanctuary message needs to be revisited and taught to the next generations, few of who seem to know much about what it means in the Great Controversy and the Plan of Salvation. The Lord provided a Doctor to cover my practice in a rather miraculous way, so I prepared to go.

Arriving on Monday, I found that I was not in a Hanger, as requested, but in an outside tent with no tables and no chairs. After visiting a hanger on Tuesday, I humbly bowed my head and praised the Lord that we were in a tent outside.

After begging, borrowing and snatching chairs, many provided by the very kind staff who knew how much we needed chairs, we had room at the tables for about 50 people. I had brought Xeroxed supply "packets" for approximately 250 student participants.

Darwin Whitman and his lovely wife Joyce were setting up in a second tent adjacent to the small-scale outside model of the Sanctuary being set up by the enthusiastic men from Andrews University, "Moses and his helpers", who gave wonderful tours to all their visitors. Since the base to my Sanctuary model never showed up until Thursday, and Darwin had such wonderful teaching materials, including a power-point presentation, he and I teamed up - all in the Lord's planning! I taught more to the Pathfinder honor questions, and he taught more in the Seminar style to which he was accustomed, as he travels the U.S. teaching Seminars in any location. We both covered all the material in the basic Sanctuary Honor, and many of the questions in the Advanced Honor.

We quickly used the 250 packets and I went to Kinkos and had printed up 500 even more extensive packets. Another trip I brought back 300 more packets. Darwin copied even more materials, and on Sabbath we brought out blank paper and the last of our 2 basic work sheets! We suspect that we taught the honor to over 1200 persons, perhaps even 1400!! Sabbath the tent was packed! The tables and chairs were occupied, and people lined the edges, sitting on chairs, on the ground, and standing. Praise the Lord!

We did encourage everyone to order their honor patch, thus encouraging The Honors Committee and Advent Source to get a patch available soon!

pencils disappeared, people were angry about not having a seat at a table, and others expected us to give them the patches we had told them were not yet available!

Many people requested teacher's packets with more materials, so I am getting those together. So many people, including club leaders, directors, and counselors were interested in having the Sanctuary Honor materials available for their clubs.

Camping 101



Putch Oven Cooking

This year's conference theme is American Pioneers. By teaching the Pathfinders how to use a Dutch oven you give them an idea of how the pioneers might have cooked. This year's camping recipes will focus on how to use a Dutch oven when camping.

Where do I get a Dutch oven? Here are a couple of manufacturers. <u>Lodge</u> is a company located in South Pittsburgh, TN that makes cast iron products which includes Dutch ovens. <u>MACA Supply Company</u> is another manufacturer.

When you purchase a Dutch oven make sure that it is a camp Dutch oven. This type has a flanged lid that will hold the charcoal coals on it, and help keep ashes from falling in the pot when you are checking the food. Another thing to look for is one that has integral legs for campfire and fireplace cooking. Here are several links that will help get you started.

Dutch Oven Cooking Mississippi Mud Cake

1 yellow cake mix prepared as directed

Topping

10 oz bag semi sweet chocolate chips 3/4 cup chopped pecans powdered sugar

Mud

½ cup cocoa powder 2 cups brown sugar

1 cup hot water

2 tsp. vanilla

1 tsp cinnamon

Line the bottom and sides of a 12" Dutch oven with heavy foil. To the oven add prepared cake mix.

Prepare The Mud: In a separate bowl combine all "Mud" ingredients and stir until well mixed. Pour mud mixture over the cake batter.

Bake: Cover Dutch oven and bake using 8-10 briquettes bottom and 14-16 briquettes top for 60 minutes. Sprinkle chocolate chips and pecans over top of cake about 5 minutes before cake is done.

Dust top of cake with powdered sugar just before serving. Serve warm with whipped cream.
